# PRESENTATION : STATE OF THE BATTALION 6 JUN - 6 DEC 65 AT 2 RAR THEATRE 10 DEC 65

#### COMMANDING OFFICER 1.

Introduction 6th Bn The Royal Australian Regiment is 6 months old. The idea of this presentation is to get the battalion together to let everyone know what has happened during the first 6 months of 6th Battalion training and to let you know what the battalion has done, its present training and possible future commitments.

#### b. Future

The future is uncertain. We are under no state of warning however. We are to be ready as soon as possible. We should be able to achieve this by the end of May. In March with another 100 reinforcements we will be brought to full strength less the Surveillance Platoon. My own personal opinion only: -

"We will be given some task, some where, next year".

# c. Training Activities

When formed on 6 Jun we were very much organized on a skeleton form. A Coy and D Coy were very much in skeleton form and virtually only officers and NCOs existed. Their tasks were to prepare for reinforcements in Sept from selective service trainees call ups. B Coy and C Coy were substantially complete companies which had been transferred as a whole from 2 RAR. Sp Coy existed but was very week. Adm Coy was fairly strong on the ground. Bn HQ was very weak on the ground.

#### -d. Aims

We set out to establish Sp Coy first, because of the requirement for specialists within the battalion and also because it takes longer to train Sp Coy than any other company. Adm Coy and Bn HQ were also established as they had to provide the necessary administrative basis for the subsequence expansion of the battalion. To do this it was necessary to decimate B Coy and C Coy. If this had not been done 6th Battalion would not be in the state that it is today. Besides this we had to build up a rifle company at full strength. This company was C Coy. To do this B Coy was furthur "hacked about".

# e. Training Cycle

This was in two parts. .

#### PART A

The time between June and August was purely an organising period for the battalion and an administration period for the companies.

# PART B

In the period Sep - Dec we set out to do a period of consolidation, which included corps training. Platoons were then recognizable on the ground and could function as platoons. However a lot more training is required to operate efficiently. To complete the necessary training we set ourselves a series of courses

which started in June; the first being a first promotion course to bring ourselves up to junior NCO requirements with a small reserve. This was followed by a Promotion to Sergeants Course. Other courses were RP's Course, Intelligence Course, 3in Mortar Course, Basic Radio Operators Course, Assault Pioneers Course and Drivers Course. Later it was found necessary to run a Morse Course also. This course was not completed because of unit training commitments. However all members are able to converse in morse, and at present they are still practising. An 81mm Mortar Course was also run but firing has not yet taken place. A First Aid Course was also run by B Coy and a Storemans Course. We were then forced to run a second First Promotion Course.

There will be no opportunity to run any more First Promotion Courses until next June or July.

# f. Activities Done

From June - August there was only one exercise by C Coy - exercise SPRINGBOARD ONE. B Coy was enemy. September - December was devoted mainly to corps training. During this period Bn HQ went into the field four times. It is now capable of operating in the field as a Battalion Headquarters. With more training it will be proficient. Helicopter training was also included in the training. B and C Coys Helicopters moved to the Mt BYRON Area and did a company attack exercise. EXERCISES SPRINGBOARD 2, 3, 4 and 5 were also carried out. These were very realistic and valuable exercises.

# g. Things Not Done

Officer training was carried out for about two months; however training commitments did not permit this to continue and it was stopped. NCO training was also to be carried out but this too was abandoned. TENTs were also to be carried out but these were not done. Night training was not carried out either on the scale envisaged. B and C Coys did a week each which proved very successful; however this was far too short to be really effective.

# h. Programme for 1966

The time will be devoted to company training as well as getting the Battalion prepared to go overseas. Every company will also go through JTC for 4 weeks. This will be individual training within the company and will include a company exercise. The Battalion exercise is now in May and not March, at SHOALWATER BAY.

# j. Proposed Courses for 1966

A Platoon Commanders Minor Tactics Course of a weeks duration. A Flame Warfare Course first for the pioneers for 1 week then a course to train groups from rifle companies. The A tk Pl will also do a course on the 106mm RCL. When the Carl Gustav arrives all those required to use it will be trained in the use of this weapon. Company Operators Courses will be carried out by companies. An Air Mobility Exercise will be conducted in May to become familiar with the Caribou. Our SOPs will be published in pocket size form early in '66.

# k. Summing Up

We have achieved a lot however because of a lack of time some things were not successful. There is a need to do a great amount of bush work. Concerning the future, there is nothing definite at this precise time.

d. Application has been made to the dress committee at AHQ for 6 RAR to be issued with a khaki beret in place of the present blue one. To date no answer.

#### 2IC ADDRESS 3.

a. Operational Readiness

To move a battalion we must be on 21 days to move. An individual needs only to be on 7 days within Australia or overseas. The Individual requirement for a soldier is that all of his kit is correct, and up to date with his weapons. The whole battalion requires that all members are up to date with dental and needles. This is an individual requirement. It is necessary to ensure that we know how to pack vehicles and to pack equipment into boxes if we are travelling in other means then vehicles. Move on light scale in helicopters and minimum on our backs. Time is short so it is necessary that everyone be prepared to move. This includes families knowing and prepared for this.

# b. Equipment State of Battalion

(1) Generally Speaking

We are not short much on war stores. We are short of:-

- (a) PD Greens and hats.
- (b) Gaiters and boots.
- (c) Summer dress (special sizes)

# (2) Equipment Side

Trying to get two additional items to make carrying our loads more confortable. The first is a bigger pack similar to the 37 Web packabut larger. The second is a larger basic pouch to make the carrying of ammo much easier. The green bush jungle hat is still arriving from overseas. Not known when it will arrive. Very short of compasses and protractors at section level.

(1) 10 sets just about had it. Radio Sets:-

- (2) 510 and 9 sets still usable but almost worn out.
- (3) 6 x 25 sets should arrive about March 1966.

Other sets could replace the 510 and 9 sets but this is in the far future.

Flamethrowers: still not here but should arrive in 1 week or so. 81mm Mortars Armo should arrive in January which will allow the mortar platoen its first live firing.

Carl Gustav should be available about March 66.

The Armilite 233 rifle will not replace the 7.62 SLR. However if we go into a war area these could be held in bulk for special mission but will not become general issue within Australia. OMCs about to go out of service and are to be replaced by FI which

should be available about July 66. Vehicles - own about 35 - Some vehicles about to be replaced which takes place at 30,000 miles.

# c. Regimental Funds

Started off receiving a grant from Central Amenities Organization Melbourne of £1,295. A large amount was spent on sporting equipment, about £643. Scent another £190 on flags, photographic equipment, etc. Received 2 rebaits from ASCO for £164 and £473. Yearly average about £150. The current balance is £1232. Large expenditure - Christmas party and drinks for soldiers on Christmas Day living in. Athletics . and football equipment. Canteen hours have now been improved.

# Question

Why is everything so expensive in canteen?

# Answer

All things bought in the canteen are at retail price. The battalion buys all their requirements wholesale. We get about £140 back from canteen. We can do nothing about the prices.

#### IO ADDRESS 4.

When battalion was raised the intelligence section was very much understrength . A course was run which bought the section up to a strength of Int Cpl 1

This course also provided each company with a rep. At present an Int \* 神神 Course is been run at Mosiman in Sydney for furthur training.

# b. Unit Activities

The section does administrative side of schools and courses except movement. The section bids for courses on returns submitted by companys and approved by the commanding officer. Policy of Battalion so far is to get as many as possible on these

Section also responsible for range booking and close training areas.

We have put in a request and they are being printed. We just have Answer to wait until they arrive.

# c. Athletics

Requirement is for a concrete training programme however because of training commitments this is not possible. Instructors will be put out in late January to form the 6 RAR athletic team with as many inter unit games as possible.

Major Competitions: (1) Northern command championships early April.

(2) Enter service probably Leng Park on 8 April.

Athletic equipment - companies held some stores but do not hold sufficient to train a team. It will rely to a great deal on an individual doing his own individual training. The team will try to train together as often as possible.

# e. Daily Ceremonial

Guard mount will be a standard procedure and will be done correctly with bugle and finally a band when effective. We must remember the drummers in Adm Company who have worked with other units, yet have not received any credit for it, well done. Our ceremonial must retain a high standard for this is how our unit is judged in the public eye.

### d. Discipline

In this unit fair to good. The present trouble is not been handled at section or platoon level and higher officers are spending a great deal of time hearing unnecessary charges. However, there are cases when it is necessary. Do not hesitate to do this. Saluting around the camp is not bad. However it is very slack and sloppy. The way to rectify this is through platoon and company training on the parade ground.

#### e. Dress

On ceremonials dress is good. Our normal dress around camp however leaves something to be desired. Hats are particularly bad, including chin straps and badges. Boots also must be in good shape. They generally are not even bush boots. Those going on leave will wear the correct clothes as laid down. If you go into town in uniform do the right thing and live up to the required standard. Wearing of Greens to and from work is permitted providing you do not stop at stops, hotel etc it is allright.

#### f. Cars

Use the correct car parks and all vehicles are to be registered with the RP Section. Keep to the speed limit of 15 mph in the unit area and also when you are in Engineers or NCPD area.

#### g. Alachol

Do not bring any into the area. If you return from a party etc, you can leave it at the duty room with the RP Section and pick it up on next departing. The RP office is not a hotel bottle department.

# j. Ammunition

Grant to unit from 1 Jan to 31 Dec of a yearly allocation

- (1) Attractive ammo stores all used.
- (2) Small arms ammo have not used  $\frac{1}{4}$  of grants.
- (3) Requirements for ammunition must be in 30 days before they are wanted.

### k. Information

Individual responsibility to read standing orders and unit routine orders. This is not being done. The chain of command is not working either.

# 6. A Company Commanders Address

a. Organisation: Formed from B Coy 2 RAR.

Strength of 2 and 40 mainly NCOs on formation. Period of 6 June to
10 Sept training of NCOs and preparation for selected trainees and coys
training. The training consists of an exercise at Greenbank and Tin
Can Bay. B Coy and other companies to reinforcement them on 15 Nov.
